I insisted on more options.

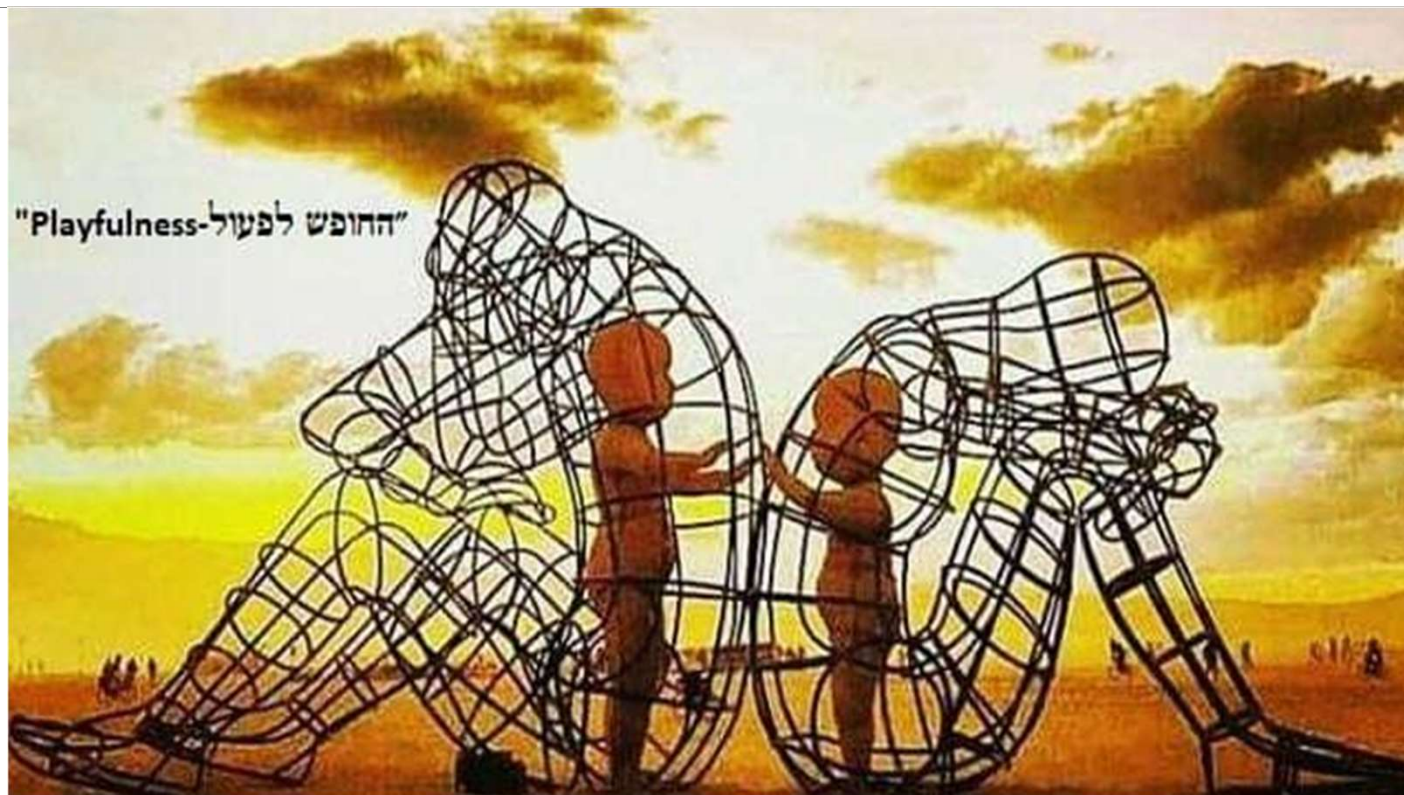
I started asking questions - logical questions. Some were embarrassing questions.
